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this book breaks new ground in translation theory and practice the central question is in what ways are translations affected by text types the two main areas of investigation are a what are the advantages of focusing on text types when trying to understand the process of translation how do translators tackle different text types in their daily practice b to what extent and in what areas are text types identical across languages and cultures what similarities and dissimilarities can be observed in text types of original and translated texts part i deals with methodological aspects and offers a typology of translations both as product and as process part ii is devoted to domain specific texts in a cross cultural perspective while part iii is concerned with terminology and lexicon as well as the constraints of mode and medium involving dubbing and subtitling as translation methods sonnets sagas fairy tales novels and feature films sermons political speeches international treaties instruction leaflets business letters academic lectures academic articles medical research articles technical brochures and legal documents are but some of the texts under investigation in sum this volume provides a theoretical overview of major problems and possibilities as well as investigations into a variety of text types with practical suggestions that deserve to be weighted by anyone considering the relation between text typology and translation the volume is indispensable for the translator in his her efforts to become a competent text aware professional

traces the history of the bible from the earliest manuscripts to contemporary translations

the apocryphal gospels is a collection of texts and new translations of the gospels that were not included in the new testament bart d ehrman and zlato please leading scholars of early christianity of the university of north carolina have compiled 42 english translations of texts and textual fragments from the original greek latin and coptic for the first time this book includes non canonical gospels from the early centuries of the church in an original text and facing page translation edition this will be a pivotal source of reference for scholars and graduate students of the new testament early church history antiquity and late antiquity and ancient greek latin and coptic languages

translation has been a crucial process in world culture over the past two millennia and more in the english speaking cultures many of the most important texts are translations from homer to beckett the bible to freud although recent years have seen a boom in translation studies there has been no comprehensive yet convenient guide to this essential element of literature in english written by eminent scholars from many countries the oxford guide to literature in english translation meets this need and will be essential reading for all students of english and comparative literature it highlights the place of translation in our culture encouraging awareness of the issues raised making the translator more visible concentrating on major writers and works it covers translations out of many languages from greek to korean from swahili to russian for some works e g virgil's aeneid which have been much translated the discussion is historical and critical showing how translation has evolved over the centuries and bringing out the differences between versions elsewhere with less familiar literatures the guide examines the extent to which translation has done justice to the range of work available the guide is divided into two parts part i contains substantial essays on theoretical questions a pioneering outline of the history of translation into english and discussions of the problems raised by specific types of text e g poetry oral literature the second much longer part consists of entries grouped by language of origin some are devoted to individual texts e g the thousand and one nights or writers e g ibsen proust but the majority offer a critical overview of a genre e g chinese poetry spanish golden age drama or of a national literature e g hungarian scottish gaelic there is a selective bibliography for each entry and an index of authors and translators

early modern culture was multilingual and so were many of the works produced across europe and beyond its borders the contributors to this volume draw new interrelations between different humanistic traditions and multilingual and translational writing practices using a wide range of primary sources documents produced in norwich scientific treatises by galileo and stevin travel accounts and dictionaries by james howell translations and retranslations of antoine de nervèze's moral letters aljamiado documents and short comic plays in spain jesuit pedagogical theater in new france grammars dictionaries and historiographical accounts in missionary contexts and a mining law code in south central europe that highlight the significance of polyglossia in early modern cultural production and transmission covering a wide range of languages including latin nahuatl and turkish their analysis invites comparison with today's polyglot practices in a globalized world as we also adapt to new technologies and ever changing realities

one of the first attempts to present a comprehensive study of legal translation this book is an interdisciplinary study in law

and translation theory it is not bound to any specific languages or legal systems although emphasis is placed on translation between common law and civil law jurisdictions the main focus is on the translation of texts which are authoritative sources of the law examples are cited primarily from statutes codes and constitutions canada switzerland and belgium as well as instruments of the european union and international treaties and conventions dealing with theoretical as well as practical aspects of the subject matter the author analyses legal translation as an act of communication in the mechanism of the law thus making it necessary to redefine the goal of legal translation this book is intended for both lawyers and linguists translation theorists legal translators and drafters legal lexicographers as well as teachers and students of translation

the rabbinic sages of antiquity are known for their sophisticated and creative reading of scripture but beginning in the third century ce these sages also took on extensive commentary on another kind of text the sages own teachings focusing on the first collection attesting to this branch of scholarship the oft neglected talmud yerushalmi the rise of talmud argues that this new project presented a wide ranging transformation of the sages scholarly practice and self perception on the one hand it engaged premises and methods distinct from those the sages applied to scripture such as textual criticism and the interpretation of texts in light of the individuals to whom they were attributed on the other hand this book shows this distinct approach did not stem from preexisting differences in the conceptions of scripture and rabbinic teachings it reflected a broad reconceptualization of the tradition diverging from how these teachings were construed by earlier generations recognizing these unique aspects of ancient talmudic scholarship centers its development as a pivotal moment in jewish intellectual history and offers a richer picture of rabbinic hermeneutics it also allows us to situate it better among other scholarly traditions of the greco roman world and to examine how different ideas aims and contexts shape textual scholarship including our own

interest to scholars and researchers of philosophy of religion sociology of religion anthropology of religion cultural studies comparative religion religious studies and asian studies
