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essays in religion and morality brings together a dozen papers of varying length to these
two themes so crucial to the life and thought of william james reflections on the two
subjects permeate first james s presentation of his father s literary remains second his
writings on human immortality and the relation between reason and faith third his two
memorial pieces one on robert gould shaw and the other on emerson fourth his
consideration of the energies and powers of human life and last his writings on the
possibilities of peace especially as found in his famous essay the moral equivalent of war
these speeches and essays were written over a period of twenty four years the fact that
james did not collect and publish them himself in a single volume does not reflect on their
intrinsic worth or on their importance in james s philosophical work since they include some
of the best known and most influential of his writings all the essays throughout their varied
subject matter are consistently and characteristically jamesian in the freshness of their attack
on the problems and failings of humankind and in their steady faith in human powers

the first issue of the international journal for the philosophy of religion appeared in the
spring 1970 this collection of essays is presented in celebration of the twenty fifth
anniversary of the journal contributors to the volume are to be counted among today s
leading philosophers of religion they represent different approaches to the philosophical
consideration of religion and their published work is helping shape discussions of the philo
sophy of religion as we approach the beginning of the twenty first century considered by
some to be terminal at mid century the philosophy of religion has undergone a renaissance
during the second half of the century and the journal may be said to provide some of the

explanation for this development a special debt of gratitude is owed to Edgar Henderson, Robert Leet Patterson, and Henry Sprinkle, founders of the journal. Without their vision and determination, it would not have come into existence.

The essays in this volume focus on some of the topics that are shaping recent continental philosophy of religion. These primary topics include self and other, evil and suffering, religion and society, and the relation between philosophy and theology. The articles are by an international group of leading contributors to recent continental philosophy of religion.

Philosophy of religion in the Anglo-American tradition experienced a rebirth following the 1955 publication of *New Essays in Philosophical Theology*, edited by Antony Flew and Alisdair MacIntyre. Fifty years later, this volume of essays offers a sampling of the best work in what is now a very active field, written by some of its most prominent members. A substantial introduction sketches the developments of the last half century while also describing the ethics of belief, debate in epistemology, and showing how it connects to explicitly religious concerns and to the topics of the individual contributions. when this book was originally published in 1957 there had been lively debates on the air and in the press about the bearing of modern philosophy upon christianity but there had been relatively little sustained discussion of the subject this book of essays was the product of a small group of oxford philosophers and theologians who had met and talked informally for some years before writing it it is an attempt to discuss with care and candour some of the problems raised for christian belief by contemporary analytical philosophy in asking the questions raised this book makes articulate the perplexities of many intelligent people both believers and unbelievers the contributors concentrate on the way such concepts as god revelation the soul grace are actually used rather than asserting or denying some very general theory of meaning

traditional theistic proofs are often understood as evidence intended to compel belief in a divinity John Clayton explores the surprisingly varied applications of such proofs in the work of philosophers and theologians from several periods and traditions thinkers as varied as Ramanuja al-Ghazali Anselm and Jefferson he shows how the gradual disembedding of theistic proofs from their diverse and local religious contexts is concurrent with the development of natural theologies and atheism as social and intellectual options in early modern Europe and America Clayton offers a new reading of the early modern history of philosophy and theology arguing that awareness of such history and the local uses of theistic argument offer new ways of managing religious and cultural difference in the public sphere today he argues for the importance of historically grounded philosophy of religion to the field of religious studies and public debate on religious pluralism and cultural diversity

thoroughly idealistic yet he in no way ignores the practical side of life for recognizing that the ideal is only truly exemplified as it expresses itself through the practical the author shows the need of the spirit having full access to the outer life we cannot do better than to quote mr dresser s own words wherein he shows the difference between the spirit and the letter one might say that what the world most needs at present is to brush away all abstractions and return to the sources of things until it is once more fired by the presence of the divine until it knows for a fact that god lives then be true to that fact live for that fact realize that the divine order is exists not merely seems to be it is not so much reasons for believing that we need as that type of conduct which accompanies thrilling belief stirring consciousness of the divine the world needs science it needs education thought thoroughgoing philosophy not mere dabbling in the metaphysical realm but it needs the spirit even more than it needs downright thinking we are absorbed in forms let us have the spirit itself therefore when you read the imperfect terms of a philosophical book remember the broadly spiritual ideal instead of singling out its defects and publishing them set a new fashion and begin to be constructive supply in your conduct what the book lacks one must be tremendously in earnest to know life one must courageously persist to the end the science of truth is inseparable from the art of life and one can no more float easily into the harbour of wisdom than one can know what love is by delegating someone to love in one s stead let philosophy become religion once more let religion be purged by philosophy let us begin work at last we have scarcely reached the age of reason we live in bits in schemes devices and shadows which we mistake for wholes and realities let us come out into the broad sunlight and be men a man is an organic assemblage and must be poet philosopher lover and much else all in one the highest life is many sided we must adore it from many points of view we must be beautiful in order truly to adore therefore let us begin to live the book is written in a clear scholarly way and is a worthy successor to the many good books that mr dresser has written mind vol 13 1904

this book contains programmatic essays that focus on broad ranging proposals for re envisioning a discipline of comparative philosophy of religions it also contains a number of case studies focussing on the interpretation of particular religio historical data from comparatively oriented philosophical perspectives

in these three essays nature the utility of religion and theism published between 1850 and 1870 english social and political philosopher john stuart mill 1806 1873 gives his most

sustained analysis of religious belief though not prepared to abandon the idea of an overall design in nature mill nonetheless argues that its violence and capriciousness militate against moral ends in nature s workings moreover any designer of such a world as we experience it cannot be all powerful and all good for nature is too clumsily made and capriciously governed however since humankind by and large cannot it seems be deprived of religion mill espouses what he calls a religion of humanity whose concepts of justice morality and altruism are based on classical models and on the new testament sermon on the mount rather than on the vindictive god of the old testament and the world hating doctrines of st paul
